Humor Definition

humor -- "a comic, absurd, or incongruous quality causing amusement." *humor that works* -- "a way of working that is different, effective, and fun."

Why Humor Matters

Humans have "emotions" and "feelings;" they get "sick" and "tired;" and they have to do things like "eat" and "sleep." *And the current way of working isn't working:*

83% of Americans feel stressed at work.¹ 55% of Americans are unsatisfied with their job.² 47% of Americans struggle to stay happy.³

This leads to 70% of employees being disengaged costing US companies up to **\$500 billion** in lost productivity every year.⁴

So why humor? People who use humor at work are more productive,⁵ less stressed,⁶ and happier.⁷

The Humor MAP

MEDIUM: How will the humor be deliverded? In an email, meeting or presentation? **AUDIENCE:** Who is the audience? What do they know? What do they expect / need?

PURPOSE: What will the humor accomplish? (See below.)

6 Reasons to Use Humor as a Project Manager

#1. To Improve Communication

Humor makes people want to read and hear what you say which helps cut through all of the noise and gets people to pay attention to your message.⁸

#2. To Build Relationships

Humor has been shown to build group cohesiveness, reduce status differentials, diffuse conflict, and aid in team and trust building among groups.⁹

#3. To Enhance Problem Solving

Humor causes the release of serotonin in your brain, which improves focus, objectivity, and overall brainpower, all vital to enhancing creativity.¹⁰

#4. To Increase Productivity

Humor improves employee productivity by reducing employee absenteeism, increasing company loyalty, and preventing short- and long-term burnout.⁵

#5. To Boost Health

Humor burns calories, decreases sensitivity to pain, and may reduce the risk of heart disease, all contributors to long-term health.⁶

#6. To Strengthen Leadership

Humor reduces hostility, relieves tension, and improves morale, increasing a leaders ability to handle stressful situations and appear in control.¹¹

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Appropriate Humor

Reasons Humor Becomes Inappropriate

- 1. *Inappropriate Subject* Humor that references subjects such as sex or drugs.
- 2. *Inappropriate Target* Humor that targets an individual or group in a negative way.
- 3. *Inappropriate Time* Humor during somber moments such as announcing lay-offs.


